WASHINGTON-FAPAC continues to carry out its mission with the launching of a career fair with the Washington Adventurist University in Takoma Park, MD. The November 19 event attracted a couple of hundred students, Asian Pacific American and other minority students. Almost 40 federal agencies set up booths and staff with recruiters to engaged the students interested in federal careers. Another career fair will be held on April 22, 2016 on the Rockville campus of the Montgomery College. With a bigger student body the event is expected to draw more attendees and especially Asian Pacific Americans due to the higher representation of AAPI in Montgomery County.

the CAPAC (Congressional Asian Pacific American Caucus) and United Solutions. Congresswoman Judy Chu, Chair CAPAC, delivered the keynote at the opening.

FAPAC Conference Planning Team Gets to Work

FAPAC will hold its 31th National Training Program on May 9-13, 2016 at the Doubletree In Orlando, FL. OPM and EEOC have agreed to offer in depth training for leadership and diversity during the NTP. Invitations have been sent to some of the recommended quest speakers or the plenary sessions. The web-site is open for registration with a simpler fee structure with some preliminary information. Announcement for the Military Meritorious Award and its Civilian Award are posted. Additional materials will be posted as information becomes available. The next planning meeting was held on December 12. A small team will visit Orlando in January to meet with community leaders and representatives from the Orlando Mayor's Office to coordinate the dissemination of information to the AAPI community in the Southern Florida area. Local media and student association representatives will be invited to the meeting.

The core element of the NTP, the workshops, is taking shape under the care of Marina Milton and Farook Sait. OPM has ommitted to offer an in-depth workshop on SES preparation tailored for FAPAC and a week long workshop on "Game Changers". An EEO Counselor training will be conducted by EEOC. Offering in-depth training at the 30th NTP proved very

popular. Seats are limited and availability will be given on a first come first served basis. Members may wish to coordinate with their agencies to assure early registration approval so they can sign up for these courses. Visit www.fapac.org to register to save your place.

On Dec 2 FAPAC held its Congressional Seminar at the Gold Room in the Golden Room at the Rayburn House Office Building with the support of the CAPAC (Congressional Asian Pacific American Caucus) and United Solutions. Congresswoman Judy Chu, Chair CAPAC, delivered the keynote at the opening. Rep. Grace Meng, Ted Lieu and Aumua Amato and Commissioner Karen Nagasaki from US Civl Rights Commission presented remarks following Judy. Other speakers include Diana Yu, Chief of Staff at the White House Initiatives AAPI and Jane Lee, Deputy COO at OPM, and others. The event was attended by more than 70 employees and executives from various agencies throughout the federal government and serves as a critical training module for FAPAC to enhance the awareness of the importance to work with Congress and be proactive with issues of interest to the AAPI community. The major issues confronted



CAPAC members are immigration, racial profiling e.g. the targeting of Chinese American scientist in the federal government and academia. The impending presidential election and the terrorism event in San Bernardino, CA will add to the complexity of these issues.
